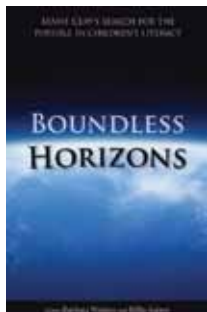
Quality books from all genres published in 2010 are shared using a PowerPoint presentation and bibliography handout.

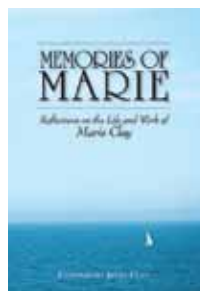
